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Question Time

Question time was held at 7.41pm.

Cr Davies left the meeting at 7:46pm.

Doug asked,

"How can rate payers have direct contact with the editors of Kingston Your City to produce their conversations without the Council blocking it?"

The General Manager Customer and Corporate Support provided the following response,

"Hi Doug, thanks for your question. Contact details are published within the front cover on the top left hand side of the magazine. This can start a conversation with the appropriate officer. While a magazine is indeed one way communication, designed to keep our community up-to-date and informed, there are plenty of ways in which Council actively seeks two way conversations and engagement. Our online and social media channels are great ways to engage, and I would encourage you to visit YourKingstonYourSay.com.au to contribute to all our currently open consultations, with more to come in the future. Of course, you can always call our switchboard and one of our great team members can help direct you to the conversation you want to have."

Rosemary West asked,

"The benchmark lists for EVCs are short lists of species that distinguish one EVC from another, and include significantly less species than the comprehensive EVC lists. These lists are meant to improve the classification and understanding of remnant vegetation, not to restrict the number and diversity of species that can be planted. Question 1: Are the Councillors aware that voting for items 13.1 and 13.2 will not protect Kingston's EVCs or natural heritage, but by limiting planting (or re-planting) to the benchmark species of the dominant EVC and by reducing the replacement ratio from 3:1 to 1:1 or less, these resolutions will damage biodiversity by reducing the number of species planted to the benchmark list and could effectively ban the replanting of trees on the foreshore as there are no trees on some of the benchmark lists? Question 2: As Kingston is low on the Council tree canopy list (coming 23rd of 31 metropolitan Councils) with only 12.3% of our canopy left (Urban Forest Strategy,p.16), How does Council propose to reach its target of restoring 30% tree canopy if the 3:1 re-planting ratio for trees that are removed is abandoned or undermined as proposed in Items 13.1 and 13.2 on tonight's agenda?"

The General Manager Planning and Place provided the following response, "In response to Question 1, Items 13.1 and 13.2 are subject to consideration by the Council on tonight's agenda and pending the direction of Council may require a further report to be prepared by Council Officers. In response to Question 2, as mentioned in response to Question 1. these matters are the subject of deliberation later in tonight's meeting. Pending the direction of Council may require a further report to be prepared by Council Officers."

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Michael asked.

"The WEF (World Economic Forum) is not elected by Australian People, and never has been. They are not an authority in Australia. Question 1: How than, and why is Kingston Council implementing their plan of "smart cities" and surveillance (spying on all Australians on Australian land? Question 2: What contract does Kingston Council have signed by Australian people for this to proceed?"

The General Manager Planning and Place provided the following response, "In response to Question 1, the Council is exploring a range of initiatives to use technology to assist it in the management of the City. A practical example is using technology in public waste bins to determine when they may need emptying. In response to Question 2, the Council has the statutory responsibility under the Victorian Local Government Act for the Kingston Local Government Area."

John asked,

"You stated that street LED lights are "sustainable" and "economical". It's noted that street LED lights turn on in the middle of the day when clouds cover the sky, so now during the winter LED lights turn on 24/7. Can you provide evidence that the LED lights are more economical than the old lights that were replaced? Please show us a breakdown of each year before and after installation."

The General Manager Planning and Place provided the following response, "When implementing the first tranche of street light conversations (approximately 6,500 lights in 2017/18) it was identified that this would reduce Councils carbon footprint by 2,458 tonnes of CO2. The saving at the time was a saving of approximately \$478K from the operating budget. This would occur through a 32.6% saving in energy costs and 31.3% saving in the Operation, Maintenance and Replacement Costs."

Sarah asked,

"Why were there so many face recognition cameras installed during lockdown at every intersection/traffic lights in the Kingston Council area, and why was this done surreptitiously without ratepayers/residents knowing? This is not road safety cameras. It's face recognition cameras and Council is responsible to inform the community for new technology being installed in a public space. It's a breach of the Privacy Act 1988 C94. We are waiting for honest answer to be provided to us in a chamber."

The General Manager Infrastructure and Open Space provided the following response.

"Council has not installed any cameras at road intersections. It is a Victoria Police matter, and the resident is advised to contact Victoria Police."

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Note: The following questions from Mya, Mark and Louise were grouped together as they were considered similar in nature:

Mya asked,

"Many suburbs in Melbourne are facing massive implant of 5G small cells in low density and residential areas. These small 5G small cells are implanted at the doorsteps of many households which is unprecedented and likely to expose biodiversity and Humans to harmful levels of electromagnetic radiation as many prominent scientists are naming us. This will drop the values of houses up to 45%. This small call roll-out as well as 5GT towers roll-out is failing to comply with 2 key principles of the telecommunications Act 1997, being essential to respecting communities welfare. 5G is not sustainable as it consumes 3 times more energy than 4G, and it is hackable and the health injuries caused by these radiation are not insurable. Question - Please provide as a map of the project of any upcoming small cells tower installations on Kingston Council territory and provide us with levels of radiation of any single of these 5G cells that residents will be expected 24/7 in the homes."

Mark asked,

"Kingston Council is responsible for any installation of LED street lights and 5G towers on its territory. Arpansa safety standards for 5G radiation are actually subject of a warning from prominent scientists in the world raising some concerns on the fact that firstly the health impacts of 5G on living organisms, human cells and DNA are not tested and secondly the level of the "acceptable" Electro Magnetic Radiation public exposure has been surprisingly raised in 2020 just before the 5G massive roll out in Australia. Why is Kingston Council stepping away from the precautionary principle and cannot provide any health risk assessment and environmental studies showing that these new levels of radiation omitted by 5G towers and LED lights are unequivocally safe for wildlife and humans?"

Louise asked.

"Following a question related to the major concern of the deployment of the military grade 5G technology (towers & small cells) untested on humans & not proven safe, Kingston Council admitted during the ordinary meeting of the 22 May 2023 its responsibility for Health & Safety for your staff and community stating that: "where risk is identified appropriate control are put in place to keep our staff and community safe". However, you have not responded clearly to this urgent concern, and told residents to refer to ACMA – ACMA had no authority for assessing or removing installed telecommunications facilities. Knowing that on 1 November 2019 the ALGA (Australian Local Government Association) has clearly raised to Parliament the health risks of this 5G rollout in Australia, and the risks of towers installed on the roof of many city buildings. Where is your evidence to now accept that exclusion of this massive 5G rollout from council planning? Clearly breaching your duty of care and risk assessment responsibilities, which are consequently putting at stake the health of the entire community, with this invisible & silent collective health threat."

The General Manager Customer and Corporate Support provided the following response:

"Federal level regulation is the domain of the Australian Radiation Protection and Nuclear Safety Agency, and on a Victorian State Level, the Department of Health regulates the use of radiation to protect people and the environment from its harmful effects by administering the Radiation Act 2005. As a Council, we rely on the advice and direction of these specialist agencies and have no active regulatory function in this space."

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Simon Begg of Chelsea asked,

"It was reported at the last Council Meeting that additional security was engaged – in response to a risk that was assessed for this risk, does it still exist and, has the control method of additional security reduced the risk to an acceptable level (for community members who attend Council meetings)?"

The General Manager Customer and Corporate Support provided the following response,

"You may or may not be aware of significant media coverage of significant levels of disruption to Council Meetings and Council and community events across Victoria this year, which in some instances caused cancellations and the Police being called to manage threatening behaviour towards Council, community and staff. As a result, officers here at Kingston undertook an exercise to review our existing procedures in relation to Council Meetings and gallery behaviour and is currently satisfied with the risk controls in place, such that we are currently able to have the Council meeting conducted tonight as we are. Of course, Council reserves the right to take any steps deemed necessary to preserve the safety of the public, Councillors and staff, to protect community assets and to ensure the good governance of the municipality most significantly through the peaceful discharge of essential Council business as managed within the Council meeting agenda."

Simon Begg of Chelsea asked,

"Kingston's Integrated Transport Strategy (KITS) states that transport systems can be improved by reducing demand for car travel by encouraging walking, cycling and public transport. Wil car travel be purposely inconvenienced as a way of engineering or contributing to this by reduced demand?"

The General Manager Infrastructure and Open Space provided the following response,

"We are not purposefully engineering to inconvenience vehicle travel as we acknowledge that cars will still be one of the chosen methods of travel for people for a variety of reasons. However, by improving accessibility and safety for other forms of travel and advocating for improved public transport to State Government, we aim to provide alternative options to reduce dependency on vehicles. Where possible, in the design of our projects, we will aim to promote and provide safe walking and cycling through our city. The Walking and Cycling Strategy is currently in development and we have consulted with our community recently on priority projects and we will be reporting shortly to Council."

Joe Crupi of Mentone asked,

"Over the weekend, rail work at Latrobe Street were conducted overnight. No one was advised night works were happening and the noise was louder than when the tunnel was constructed. Why weren't residents advised on such night works? Sleepless nights."

The General Manager Planning and Place provided the following response,

"Council was informed of the works that were being carried out at Latrobe Street by the Level Crossing Removal Project. Upon being informed of the works Council requested the Level Crossing Removal Project ensure that potentially impacted residents be notified. Council will raise the concerns raised by Mr. Crupi and ask that the Level Crossing Removal Project contact him to discuss his concerns regarding the works."

Gail asked,

"My question was read out last month and I still have not received a reply. My concern is the power of the WEF, United Nations and the WHO. Are you in agreeance with what they are implementing? Are you being incentivised to go ahead? Please can you answer verbally tonight."

The General Manager Customer and Corporate Support provided the following response,

"Apologies for not sending a reply. I will make sure we get back to you. While I am aware of the bodies that you have listed in a general sense, I'm not entirely sure of the powers or specific relevance of those bodies to Council, so perhaps read in conjunction with your previous questions, I'll make sure that you're provided with an appropriate response."
